



# Grenfell environmental checks – update on Stage 2 procurement

Stage 1 of the two-stage environmental checks into potential land contamination around the Grenfell Tower site was carried out over the spring and summer of 2019 and a full report on the results was published in October. The first stage of environmental checks showed that there is no increased risk to health from the aftermath of the fire, and the levels of chemicals found in the soil are consistent with those generally found in London.

Stage 2, which will involve carrying out further soil sampling leading to a detailed health risk assessment, will proceed as planned so we can provide further reassurance to you on any potential risk to public health.

## **Stage 2 procurement**

The process to hire a specialist to undertake Stage 2 of the environmental checks is underway using the Homes England Multi-disciplinary Technical Services Framework. This enables several specialist companies who have the right experience to deliver Stage 2 to bid for the work, while ensuring we progress with Stage 2 as quickly as possible. We expect the procurement for the new specialist to be completed in the spring.

The procurement process has taken into account feedback gathered during the Stage 1 community events, attendance at meetings and drop-in sessions, as well as from responses to our community updates and articles in North Ken News. You told us:

- Want to be kept informed on the process
- Want us to be open and transparent throughout
- Felt an approved list of suppliers (also known as a 'framework') would enable several appropriately qualified independent specialists to bid

We also asked if you would like to be involved in the procurement process. A number of residents put themselves forward and we met them in October and December to discuss how best to achieve this.

# The involved residents:

Have contributed ideas to the community engagement activities, for example suggesting a site
walkover and an easy-to-understand version of the report, which are now included as
requirements in the tender documents.

- Will review the specialists' responses on community engagement and interview them on their approach.
- Have made sure the importance of community engagement is recognised and evaluated as a stand-alone element.
- Advised that observing the full evaluation process may place potential pressure on individuals
  given the need to sign a Non-Disclosure Agreement (NDA) and we therefore agreed that this
  would not be progressed.

## Independent oversight

The Science Advisory Group (SAG), an independent group of scientific experts, reviewed AECOM's Technical Note 18 – Stage 2 Design (see full Stage 1 report) and were content with the approach proposed. This has informed the tender documents.

The Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) has appointed a new chief scientific adviser, Professor Alan Penn. The Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) also has a new chief scientific adviser, Professor Gideon Henderson. They will provide the day-to-day scientific advice and oversight of Stage 2 of the environmental checks. They will liaise with the Chair of SAG, Sir Patrick Vallance, the Government Chief Scientific Adviser, and SAG members.

Dr Paul Nathanail of Land Quality Management Limited, the independent National Quality Mark Suitably Qualified Person (SQP), reviewed all the tender documents. The role of an independent SQP in checking the specialists' work will continue during Stage 2.
